Parish Collaborative, Questions & Answers

As we approach the Archdiocesan date for <u>St Irene Parish</u> to become a collaborative with <u>Holy Family Parish</u> in Concord, our Pastor Fr Tom and the Parish Council want to communicate with transparency what to expect and how we prepare. We will use the quarterly newsletters to regularly keep you informed.



St Irene & Holy Family

What is a collaborative?

A collaborative is two (or more) parishes sharing clergy. That's it. The parishes remain separate in terms of facilities and finances. The collaborative is not a merge of parishes; only sharing of clergy. A collaborative will have one Pastor and technically might have additional members of the Pastoral team, but keep in mind the driving force behind the plan for collaboratives is a shortage of priests, so additional Pastoral team members will not be easy to come by. The Pastoral team will serve both parishes.

When will St Irene become a collaborative with Holy Family?

The collaborative between St Irene and Holy Family will become a reality on June 1st 2019. This date has been set by the Archdiocese as part of the Pastoral plan entitled <u>Disciples in Mission</u>. Fr Tom will have more than deserved his retirement by then.

Who will lead the new collaborative?

We expect to be informed early in the year (2019) who the new Pastor of the collaborative will be, so there will be a few months for both his old and new parishes to prepare for the transition. It is Archdiocesan policy not to let either of the pre-collaborative Pastors continue as Pastor for the collaborative. So we can be relatively sure that neither Fr Tom, nor Fr Austin, will be named Pastor of the collaborative. That is all we know, and all we expect to know, about the identity of our future Pastor until early 2019.

What will change beyond clergy?

Probably very little. St Irene and Holy Family are both financially stable parishes, not under fiscal pressure, but still facing declining attendance, which will eventually impact finances, if we can't turn around and start growing the parish again. We value the flexibility of offering four Masses each weekend and will work to continue that. A single Pastor cannot say all the Holy Family and St Irene Masses in a weekend. We have been successful in the past bringing in additional priests, e.g. through collaboration with Boston College School of Theology & Ministry, and we plan to continue to find ways to provide as many options as we can.

What are the parishes doing to prepare?

The two Parish Councils met in 2017 to get to know each other better, and again in February 2018. The latest meeting was the first time we knew of the collaborative start date, so the conversation focused more intently on next steps. However, there aren't any concrete issues that must be decided at this point, nor would we want to decide on collaborative specific topics without the new Pastor. We discussed areas of collaboration based on opportunity rather than need. We started thinking of social justice, digital communications, new evangelization, and adult education. Our youth education programs already have direct contact between parishes as well.

What happens next?

As a next step, we are asking St Irene's Ministry Leaders to engage directly with their Holy Family peers, where they see opportunity for synergy, and to keep the Council apprised of ideas. We want to engage more people but doing so should also result in a greater outcome. We don't want to dilute good works, we want to amplify them! That is the mind set with which we will approach preparations in 2018 for collaboration in 2019.

2018 Catholic Appeal

Right to Life

The Knights of Columbus worldwide is committed to supporting life at all stages. The original goal of the founder of the Knights of Columbus was to provide support for widows and orphans in the late 1800's. The Knights support charitable causes worldwide today as well as continuing support for families through a toprated life insurance program.

The Knights both affirm the right of the unborn child and pledge support for expectant mothers. The St Irene Knights of Columbus Council supports the Right to Life goal by holding a yearly drive to collect needed items for expectant Mothers. This year, as we did last year, we will be collecting needed items for the Archdiocesan Pro-Life office in Natick, MA. The Archdiocesan Pro-Life effort also has offices in Brockton and Brighton where they provide needed items to expectant mothers as well as crisis counselling and newborn nursing care. This year they have a critical need for Newborn sizes. They need Newborn outfits for boys and girls and Newborn Onesies for boys and girls. They also would like Dr. Brown bottles (4 oz and 8 oz) and Dr. Brown pacifiers. They request the same brand (Dr. Brown) bottles and pacifiers as premature babies especially need the same nipples. Lastly they could use Sleep n' Plays (small sizes). By state law all items must be new with original sales tags attached.

The collection will be taken up during a weekend in March or April. Please watch for the announcement of the date for this worthwhile appeal in upcoming bulletins.

Adult Faith Formation

The Adult Faith Formation program at St. Irene's presents a number of programs throughout the year, which we hope you will find fulfilling and informative. Gatherings are scheduled at various times - some on mornings after the 9 o'clock Mass; others on Friday evenings - with the aim of reaching many parishioners at times available to them. All sessions take place in the Parish Hall.

The final installment of the 2017-2018 Adult Education program is the Friday April 6th 7 pm presentation by Dr.Richard R. Gaillardetz, who holds the Joseph Chair of Catholic Systematic Theology at Boston College. He has published numerous articles and has authored or edited eleven books. Dr. Gaillardetz served as president of the Catholic Theological Society of America between 2013 and 2014 and has been a delegate on the US Catholic-Methodist Ecumenical Dialogue. He is a vibrant and engaging speaker, whom you won't want to miss!

We give time for and encourage discussion among attendees. Refreshments will be served at each session. All are welcome, young and old, parishioners and non-parishioners, with the hope that we can learn more about our faith, and learn more about how our faith "works" in our busy lives.


Thank You from Puerto Rico

Malawi Project

Thank you for opening your hearts to the new classroom building project for the Thunga Primary School in Malawi. Because of your generosity and heeding the call to help those in need, whether local, national or international, we have exceeded our all-parish goal of \$30K and have raised more than \$32K for this project in just 5 short weeks during Lent 2018 (despite school vacation, storms and power outages!) It is truly miraculous and a testament to the faith and good works of this parish. Because of this, 3 classrooms will be built at the school, which will ease overcrowding (currently there are about 200 students per classroom!) and remove barriers to education. If you would still like to contribute, money will go toward Kelsey's "wish list" at the site, including improvements to the latrines. St Irene Financial Council Report

The Finance Council is pleased to publish the 2017 final results and the budget for 2018, see the downloadable financial reports on St Irene's Financial Reports page. Thank you very much to parishioners who increased giving in 2017. The increased giving and a large bequest made 2017 a very successful year. For 2018 you can see that operating expenses are anticipated to rise in several areas. Nearly all these increases are beyond our control. Also remember that our beautiful Church is now 20 years old and will need updates to systems in the near future. Without increased collections and large gifts, we will have a significant deficit in 2018. St Irene is experiencing decreased participation due to parishioners leaving for various reasons, and there are very few new parishioners joining St Irene. As we cannot count on large gifts and bequests, it is important that those parishioners who haven't increased their contribution to St Irene please consider doing so in 2018. The suggested augmentation is to increase your giving by 20%. It is also imperative that all parishioners ensure that contributions are made throughout the year, and that is made much easier by using online giving through St Irene's web link or via scheduled payments through a bank, see the Electronic Giving page on St Irene's web site.
